Programming the Motorola MT2000

The Motorola MT2000 are commercial radios manufactured in the 1990's.



There are many available now as surplus from businesses and governments. While they are narrow-band compliant, channels (aka `personalities')

can be set to wideband for ham use. They are rugged, but not front-panel programmable. Some versions have displays, some do not. Batteries and chargers are widely available, as are replacement antennas. Programming requires a PC or laptop that has a serial DB9 port and can

boot from a USB thumb drive, software, and a cable.

The software and cable are available from Ebay, and you may still have a PC with a serial port at home, or it can also be purchased used. In my case, I found a Dell d630 locally via Craigslist. Many thanks to my friend in Scouting Bill Clark N3DOU for giving me a head start.



Once the laptop is set up to boot from USB, it boots quickly into FreeDOS.

On the next page, the channel is set from narrow to wideband by setting "Tx Deviation" to 5.0 kHz – this moves channel spacing to the required 25.0 kHz. You will sound quiet and attenuated without setting this to wide.

Disaster Assessment

To know if a family has been impacted, and to what degree, is the job of Damage / Disaster Assessment Teams. Many other charities and some government rely on Red Cross Damage assessment in their client service. Aggregate data is also valuable for government officials who are trying to recover dollars or get aid for communities, or in order to make a declaration.

<u>Client Service</u>

As we make the transition from Response to Recovery - we are engaging in Client Service to help folks with aid and referrals. For Example, Harris County has a Home Clean Up Help line available from Ready Harris.
